giving us a talk on how he grows his Phragmipediums.

Phragmipediums are new world ladyslippers that grow from Mexico through the central and northern parts of South America. They can be found growing on rock outcroppings (Mexipedium xerophyticum), in forks of trees (caudatum), or volcanic clay (boisserianum or wallisii). Some plants such as longifolium, ecuadorense, pearcei, or klotscheyanum grow submerged underwater through periods of heavy rainfall. These could be the ones for you if you are a heavy waterer!

I know when it comes to the hybrid plant of the evening I often talk about how old hybrids are still capable of winning, and this is no exception. As always, the Cushways have exhibited excellent quality that is excellently grown. **Specie Plant of the Evening** Grown by G & H. Williams *Oberonia titania*



Great to see a native winning on the bench, although this plant is also found in Java and New Caledonia, as well as being 7one of the few orchids native to Norfolk Island. The plant is named for Oberon and Titania, king and queen of the fairies in

Shakespeare's *A midsummer night's dream*. Up close, it has quite a distinct floral arrangement, boasting some of the smallest flowers in the orchid world.

Dendrochilum magnum var. macranthum



One of the best *Dendrochilum* (and by best i mean largest) for the bench, this is a great plant worth a space in any collection. As always, well grown by Cathy, and I can't wait to see this as a large specimen in a few years.

Ornithopora radicans

For those that hate name changes, this might not be one for you, having frequently been changed over the years. Coming from around 400m elevation and reasonably widespread across Brazil, this is an easy one to grow here in Sydney, despite most sources stating it as a warm to hot grower. It needs even moisture



throughout the year, with only a short rest when pseudobulbs have matured. This is an excellent specimen, well done Tinka.

Extract from Alan Merriman Newsletter May 2019. Well what should we be doing with our plants? With our cymbidiums we should start to move plants with spikes under cover. Check for insects – scale etc, if present you may have to physically remove the scale before the scale gets onto the flowers spikes. Place plants under cover away from wind and rain – frost – maybe! Fertilise with a high P+K fertilise such as MERRIFERT CAMPBELLS YELLOW can also be applied every 7 – 14 days. Make sure all of the leaves have been wetted thoroughly. DO NOT USE ON COLD WET DAYS! Water weekly.

CATTLEYS under cover can last 7 to 10 days before they need watering. Fertilise every 7 to 10 days. Look out for scale! This goes for all miscellaneous type orchids. DO NOT OVER WATER when under cover ! Water only in the mornings on sunny days. This means the water should have dried out between the leaves - bulbs! If your sarcs or any blooms if known to be susceptible to botrytis spotting, spray with Ippon Aquaflo. Note: check the pH of the water before mixing! Remember Ippon® is a systemic broad spectrum water based formulation. Your seedlings should be pushed along before winter hits us. Use PROPLANT® every 28 days. Remember it is preventive and curative. This makes it one of the best fungicides around!

Phalaenopsis should now be under cover. Very soon the heat machines should be turned on. They have already had their temperature drop treatment to get their flowers on the move. The Committee is trying to organise a bus trip for members to the Tinonee Open Day on Saturday 13th July. By all accounts it is a terrific day and there are many guest speakers talking on the Saturday.

As a way of giving back to the members the society will pay for the bus hire. If we don't get enough members it will be cancelled. Please indicate if you are interested in going by emailing Tinka or seeing her at the next member's meeting.
