Carv's Notes.

It was great to get back to having a monthly meeting again. It was good to see everybody and how well you have all been growing your plants. The Novice Section in particular is looking very strong and healthy which is encouraging. In fact, I think that we will have to put out an extra table or two to ease the congestion. It is very important to ensure that you have benched your plants in their right sections so that the judging can proceed more smoothly. Also it is important to always consider your fellow members when benching and to take care not to conceal or damage plants that are already on the bench. This applies to EVERYBODY, not just the novices. All you have to do is ask me or one of the judges if you're not sure about the right benching class or making a bit more room.

At home, even though I've been getting through a bit of work, I'm still well behind with repotting, but I am at least keeping up with my foliar feeding program and I think that it's starting to pay off finally. It's very easy to do thanks to the Swagman Sprayer. And once again, if I'm feeling a bit slack, tired or am short of time I still ensure to do a walk past at least once a day to keep up monitoring. In fact if I know that there is something happening overnight I make sure that I get out there with a torch (with Jill holding the torch of course so that I have both hands free to deal with any pests). It is really amazing how easy crickets are to catch at night compared to in the day, and of course that's when you will find those elusive slugs and snails.

I don't think that I've ever had so many aphids. In a crowded collection they can be very hard to spot. You basically have to check every new growth and flower spike. Because they proliferate so quickly, doing a walk past

every few days is not really good enough because a lot of damage can be done in a very short period of time. Did you know that aphids have a very unusual life cycle? Every 2nd generation is produced asexually ie virgin birth, so what it means is that there is no delay once maturation occurs, so they give birth straight away and that's why their numbers boom so quickly.

As you already know, I'm a bit of a fan of dish culture and I've finally been able to put some small Bulbophyllums into dishes that have been well overdue for a repot, in fact a couple have been languishing. Hopefully they will turn around now. It is really important that they are secure and are immovable while they get established.

Isn't it a shame in one way that one of the most spectacular orchids you can grow, flowers at this time of year and not at showtime? I'm talking about Laelia purpurata of course and we had some fine examples at our meeting. It would be fair to say that Bill Dobson is a master of purpurata (and other things) culture. If any of you have been to Bill's you might be a bit mortified at his growing conditions. If you haven't, I can tell you that they are in full sun on a concrete slab! It's completely counterintuitive but you can't argue with the result. Maybe we should get Bill as a guest speaker to let us in on a few of his tricks. See you at the next meeting and happy growing.

Dear What's the Problem?,

I have something at the base of several new growths on a new oncidium Mem Burt Fields I purchased earlier in the year. (see photo 1). It seems soft underneath when I pull back the bracts. Is it treatable?

Thanks.

Stranded in Lockdown

The following was suggested by MWOS's own President, Guy Cantor:

It looks like you have damping off caused by fungus. Water may have accumulated in the bracts. It may need a position with more air flow and sun. Treat with a fungicide, although if it has already gotten into the new growth, you may need to cut them off. Cinnamon is good for this. Good luck!

Follow up note:

The affected new growths were removed showing internal rotting. (Photo 2) The "patient" was treated, has recovered and now has unaffected new growth!
