Unfortunately I do not have photos of the Specimen of the Evening which is Paul McDonough's Dendrochilum uncatum var. brigispicatum and Novice of Evening which is Tony Agrela's Stanhopea oculata.

Cary's Ramble:

The last month has been pretty dreadful weather-wise and with all that water and humidity some plants are not looking so good. However I'm pleasantly surprised at how most of my plants have coped, indeed have thrived in these conditions. Among the big winners are Sarcochilus falcatus (I have alluded to this before), Maxillarias, Coelogynes, Dendrochilums, Lycastes and basically anything growing on a mount. There are very few fungal problems surprisingly. Because I have a bit of a crowding problem (hands up those who don't), I've moved quite a few plants back to Allambie Heights where I still work. There they are under 30% shade cloth facing north (with no trees in the way!) with ample are flow and with very little care they are doing far better than most of my plants at home. Of course these

particular plants are suited to high light and include Laelias anceps, purpurata and tenebrosa, Dendrobiums, Vanda tricolor and Oncidiums. They get no feeding apart from slow release already in the mix. So the moral of the story is that light and air are crucial to healthy growth.

You can always do something about too much light. It's impossible to deal with not enough light without resorting to artificial light. When I went to the WOC in Ecuador some years ago, I purchased a Maxillaria molitor 'Orange', a truly stunning thing. Now, this plant has a notorious reputation for not surviving quarantine, in fact I have it on good authority that all the imports into Australia so far have failed. Anyway, mine was on its last legs when it came out of quarantine with a very weak new growth. That was in May 2017. It has struggled with me, growing and improving slowly. Recently I noticed some new growths at the base of the lead bulb. Mr Maxillaria (Paul McDonough) has confirmed them to be flower buds, so even though we still have a way to go, this is very exciting.

The aphids are still busy at my place (not at Allambie Heights) and I find them quite troublesome because they are not obvious until they proliferate. Apart from that I'm getting some scale on my Cattleyas in the hothouse and I deal with it as I see it. I am still foliar feeding when it's not raining, but have not had much time to do any repotting.
