The Ramble:

As per usual I've been having a pretty disrupted and haphazard time where my orchids are concerned. And it's not just the weather. It's all sorts of things such as work, fishing, car stuff, art and the constant domestic duties that can get in the way. But I still make the effort to do a walk-past at least every day or two to keep an eye on things. I find that the plants at Allambie Heights are doing extremely well with very little attention. This is entirely due to the abundant air and light that is available there.

Some of you may have taken the plunge and had a go at growing plants out of a flask. This is no mean feat, even for an experienced grower. If you do attempt this exercise it is imperative that these newly deflasked plants are in a situation where you can keep a close eye on them. They need to be in a position where you can check on them at least two or three times a day. They are very vulnerable right now and can quickly go into a state of irreversible decline. Mostly it's about a rapid loss of moisture making recovery impossible. Maintaining humidity is crucial to success. I'm very lucky because I'm actually "allowed" to keep my new baby seedlings on the kitchen island bench. They are planted in fine bark and the pots sit on a bed of moist sphagnum moss so humidity is maintained. Also I have a spray bottle handy and they are sprayed two or three times a day. Mostly they are okay but since we have ramped up the heating they have definitely deteriorated. The fact that I can look at them quite easily at any time is what has actually saved them. Hopefully, by increasing the frequency of misting and watering, I'll be able to turn things around.

On another note, I have just learned that the Coelogyne genus is about to be expanded to include the genus Dendrochilum and about a dozen other genera. This is just another raft of name changes that are being foisted upon us. When something like this happens it is referred to as "lumping" and when the reverse happens it is called "splitting". The botanists obviously have their reasons for doing these sorts of things but it can be very frustrating for the hobby grower, because it can have ramifications for hybrid names as well and this can create a lot of confusion. At the end of the day we all just want to enjoy growing our plants.

It appears that the paper titled "Expansion of the Genus Coelogyne" by Mark Chase et. al. published in May 2021 has been accepted .

The Kew Checklist of Selected Plant Species (WCPS) has now listed all of our beloved Dendrochilums as synonyms of Coelogynes . All other related genera, apart from Pleione, also appear to have been included as Coelogyne.

Being a simple Dendrochilum loving engineer, I have no choice but to reluctantly accept these changes. "SIGH!" 😣
