Cary's Ramble:

As I alluded in my report, it's been a busy month with orchid events etc and to top it all off, with spring starting to ramp up, the plants are starting to move. This means that there are jobs to be done in earnest. Things such as increasing the feeding regime and repotting. Some of my repotting will involve Coelogynes in water well pots. These are going gangbusters so it will be interesting to see their root systems.

This season, I have decided to approach the repotting a little differently. After talking to one or two people, in particular dear friends Guy Cantor and Bill Dobson (legends in the orchid world), I'm changing my mix a little. I've decided to add perlite and clay balls to my presoaked bark. Also crushed eggshells as well (so the Thermo Mix is good for something after all).

As far as pests go, there is still some persistent scale around. Have you ever noticed that some plants are very prone to scale attack and they might go on for years with a chronic problem which one keeps treating with no real permanent cure? Some of the Laeliinae come to mind. Every time you think that you've won, all of a sudden the scale is back and surging. My classic example of this is my Epidendrum Wedding Valley 'Sakuro', a beautiful, tall, robust plant that makes a wonderful head of pink and white flowers. It's in flower right now so I went to take it to the Nth Shore monthly meeting the other night only to find that the scale was back again, so I had to clean it up first. Of course, the fact that this is such a strong plant can give one a "false sense of security" as to its health status. It means that

when one does the walk past it's easy to think that it's doing well because of its overall look. The thing is, with plants like this, I think that you just have to do a regular prophylactic spray on suspicion that the problem is always brewing away quietly.

This season we have a wonderful flowering of native Dendrobiums, in particular speciosum. Even some of my ones are looking pretty good. Things like melaleuchophilum are absolutely superb this year. I've beeen growing some of these on net pots and it really suits them. In fact it suits other things as well, such as Sarcochilus falcatus. Even things like Dockrillia (I know, Dendrobium now) teretifolia, calamiformis, fairfaxii, pugioniformis really like growing in net pots. I have examples growing from the top, from the side and even from underneath, and they are all doing well. The only potential problem is what is going to happen at repotting time, especially with the ones growing from underneath. It will be a delicate operation. But, then again, I'm used to those. Happy growing.
