Cary's Ramble.

I've written many times about the importance of doing "the walkpast". It can be done basically whenever for example, you don't feel like doing any repotting or there's not enough time to do anything else that's orchid related. It's a vital part of my orchid regime because it can actually give me a "heads up" on looming issues. It's no exaggeration for me to say that I would do this at least once a day when I'm around. So, you know how sometimes that you may have a plant that has gradually deteriorated but you still can't put your finger on what might actually be the cause? It's often very easy not to get onto it straightaway because of time constraints or distractions. I've been caught out only in the last few days with just such a situation. I have a number of plants of Leptotes bicolor and they are a favourite of mine. Well, anyway, the largest of these (basically a specimen plant with at least 10 buds) has been looking a little off lately. Imagine my dismay when I grabbed it to show it to Alan Cushway and bits started falling off it. It turned out that it was riddled with borer! Even though it was on a cork mount that was no guarantee that it was safe. The plant had basically lost its root system. I now have 10 remnants sitting in sphagnum moss hoping that I can salvage something from this disaster. So the moral of the story is to investigate problems sooner rather than later once you are aware. I still haven't been able to build up too much momentum when it comes to repotting. The fickle weather is hugely disruptive when it comes to working outside but I have managed some repotting tasks but have a lot to go. Most of my plants have put on a lot of growth, so there will be a lot of dividing and not so much potting on meaning that the benches will even be more crowded. It's very easy to avoid repotting

It's very easy to avoid reporting large plants when you know how many that you might be ending up with. There does come a time when one needs to consider rationalising their collection. Jill and I could both be accused of being plant hoarders, so the problem is not just with orchids. The thing is that we still regard it as fun and highly rewarding from a wellbeing perspective. After all, it's all about mental health isn't it?
