CARY'S RAMBLE

I have just received the June issue of "Orchids Australia" and apart from all the other great articles there is a very comprehensive piece about designing/building an orchid house in the tropics. I found it to be well thought out and it gave quite an insight into the different issues that one is faced with up north. For example, one is aiming to reduce heat a lot of the time rather than trying to increase it. Another thing that he mentions is not to have trees close by. Durrr! I thought until I read a little further on, to find that the real concern was about trees coming down or getting smashed onto your structure during a cyclone as well as the light availability issue. The advice about design and materials is excellent as well. It's certainly worth a read.

I thought that I might touch on the subject of "common orchids" that most people would have in their collections. The first one is Laelia anceps. This is a beautiful species which is very easy to grow. I just did a quick head count and was shocked that I have over forty plants! The thing is, that they don't need anything special to do well, so they are easy to neglect and still reward you. There are basically 3 distinct

populations in the wild, mostly in Mexico and each population is its own variety. Sometimes I think that this species is undervalued by growers. There are many select clones which are truly beautiful and are worth pursuing. We had a beautiful display of these at the May meeting and they will still be around for another month or two.

Another orchid is Vanda tricolor. It's probably the easiest of the Vandas in cultivation and is quite spectacular in flower. It has a wide range in the wild and this makes it very variable. In the main it is an easy cold grower here on the coast. However, I have a couple of divisions of var. magnificens (same clone) and this plant although it is cold tolerant, does not like the winter. It shows clearly on the photo below. The clean plant is out of the hothouse and the other one is growing outside. The black blotches are clearly cold damage. The second photo is of 5 different clones that I'm growing cold. Putting them in a hothouse would not improve them I don't think. There are many different clones of this orchid around, so, depending on your leanings and how much room you have, you might want to keep an eye out.

The colder months are upon us now but there are still plenty of things that we can do even though most plants are slowing. The regular walkpast is just as important as ever with new spikes developing and still plenty of potential pest activity, so be vigilant. see you at the Show
