Our St. Ives display. We came 4th and many thanks to all the helpers and especially Gloria for her help and also training some of our newer members in the fine art of display building.

Ramble:

I recently went with Bill Dobson, Guy Cantor and Paul McDonough on our annual pilgrimage to North Queensland on secret men's business (SMB), orchid related of course, and we had a wonderful time. Anyway, the week that we were away there was unseasonal heat in Sydney together with hot drying winds. We came back to flowers come and gone, particularly Dendrobium speciosum, which created a real problem for the ANOS Show. It was shaping up to be a fabulous season for these, with profuse flowering, all to be largely ruined in one week. Other things that were only buds when I left, were fully open flowers by the time I got back.

I've been trying to keep up with doing the walkpast and the importance of this was really demonstrated to me after a week away, where I found a few things that were rectified in time before too much damage was done. However, I did lose a spike on my Cattleya skinneri 'Casa Luna' AM/AOC. The spike just looked a bit weaker than the other one on the plant and I thought nothing of it, but the next day it was far more obvious that there was a problem. Closer inspection revealed that the base of the inflorescence had almost been eaten right through! A slug is probably the culprit, but I haven't found it yet, even though I have been out at night a couple of times to try and deal with it. I've already had a look tonight, but it was probably too early, so I will go out later and have another look. I have excellent lighting in my hothouse and this is a great help for pest patrol.

With the burst of heat that we've had I think that it's a good time to ramp up your feeding and watering, and also watch out for increased pest activity. I regard this time of year as critical in the growing cycle for most plants, so anything that you can do now will reap rewards. One group of plants that I grow are showing a lot of promise this season, and that is Laelia purpurata. Most are looking very strong and robust, and some already have sheaths. This is encouraging. The other things that are growing really well are most of my Vanda species. They mostly hang, which can make it a bit of a problem for benching, but as far as I'm concerned, they are well worth it. A lot of them are either flowering or are in bud so they are performing. I will have my work cut out over the next month because at the end of October we are going to Tasmania for two weeks. The

timing is terrible, not only for the orchids, but the garden in general. I don't really have a choice in the matter, so it is what it is. Anyway there are plenty of things that need to be done before then (there always are).
